Jay was an active cyclist, often traveling the world by bike or clocking a long ride in the area. He loved Maine where he spent many summers as a camp counselor, further sharing that love over countless family trips to the Maine coast. He also took great pride in coaching his sons year after year in soccer, baseball and rowing. Lastly, Jay had a deep love for the Flyers, having held season tickets since 1968, and would talk Phillies baseball to all comers. One of his last wishes was for a 1950 Phillies hat, a cold beer and a hot dog, all of which were granted. Jay is survived by his beloved wife of 60 years, Maxine; his sons Andrew and Michael; and his three cherished grandchildren.
